Risk Assessment on the Importation of Honey Bee (*Apis mellifera*) Packages from the United States of America

We are sharing with you the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) animal health risk assessment on importing honey bee (*Apis mellifera*) packages from the United States of America for your consideration.

In recent years, a number of bee diseases and pests have spread between countries through international trade in bees. International bee movement involves real risks of spreading pests and diseases, treatment-resistant strain of existing pests and diseases, or troublesome bee genetics. In the last few years, Canadian beekeepers experienced bee health challenges and significantly elevated overwinter losses.

The Agency has conducted an animal health risk assessment on the importation of honey bee packages from the USA in order to protect Canadian bee status and human health from biological agents and pests. Please be advised that the current import status of USA honey bee packages is unchanged until such time as all activities associated with this risk assessment are completed.

Thereafter, the information contained in this assessment and comments from stakeholders will assist the Agency in the risk management decision.
