Guiding Principles

Small Hive Beetle (SHB)

- Ontario's SHB status is evolving
- Anticipate SHB to spread
- SHB is a manageable pest

Management Strategy

- Must be achievable & implemented prior to the 2016 pollination season
- Requires a balanced and coordinated response from both OMAFRA & industry



Objectives

- 1. Minimize the impact of SHB to beekeepers
- 2. Mitigate the spread of SHB in Ontario
- 3. Minimize disruption of economic activity for beekeepers & growers who require pollination services



Management Strategy



• REQUIRED:

Beekeepers are required to submit a general movement plan for SHB-positive yards to OMAFRA

- May also be required for highrisk operations that are not SHBpositive
- Focus on strategic movement of colonies and risk mitigation



Documented

• REQUIRED:

Beekeepers are required to submit a BMP plan

 Documenting strategies implemented to mitigate the impact of SHB at the operation level & to reduce the spread of SHB



• REQUIRED:

Beekeepers are required to register all yards or locations where bees are kept (excluding temporary pollination yards)

Under the Bees
 Act, beekeepers
 are obligated to
 report SHB

Yard Registration

Management Strategy



- OMAFRA may inspect SHBpositive yards prior to movement to a non SHB-positive site (e.g. domestic pollination) as needed based on risk
- Inspections may be random or based on elevated risk



Biosecurity Ø **Traceability**

- OMAFRA will work with industry to develop programs, education and extension
- Encourage adoption of CFIA biosecurity standard
- Better documentation for traceability purposes



Regulatory Response

- OMAFRA maintains the ability to enact regulatory actions under the Bees Act or Animal Health Act at any time for:
 - detainment,
 - treatment or
 - destruction of non-compliant or high risk hives/yards

OMAFRA's Next Steps

- Communicate SHB
 management plan to provincial
 governments, Canadian Food
 Inspection Agency & Ontario
 beekeepers
- Review the Essex County quarantine zone
- Continued collaboration with industry
