Québec Introduces Restrictions on Agricultural Use of Bee Killing Pesticides:

CTV News Montréal announced this week that Québec is putting new restrictions on pesticides aimed at protecting pollinators.

The changes mean farmers will need permission from a certified agronomist to use certain pesticides on their crops.

The tighter rules target five pesticides, including three that are nicotine-based, known by their shortened name 'neonics.'

Alarming Link Between Fungicides & Bee Declines Revealed:

Fungicides are found to be the strongest factor linked to steep bumblebee declines, surprising scientists and adding to the threats to vital pollinators. Common fungicides are the strongest factor linked to steep declines in bumblebees across the US, according to the first landscape-scale analysis.

Martineau v Bayer Class Action Lawsuit Against Pesticide Manufacturers Now Authorized in Québec:

As part of the ongoing campaign on behalf of Canadian beekeepers whose bees and beekeeping operations have been harmed by the use of pollinator-killing neonicotinoid pesticides, <u>Siskinds LLP</u> has been successful in achieving <u>authorization this week</u> of a Class Action lawsuit in Québec on behalf of beekeepers. Named as defendants in the lawsuit are Bayer, Bayer CropScience and Syngenta.

Organic Council of Ontario Survey:

The Ontario legislature is currently considering adopting Bill 153, The Organic Products Act. The Bill is currently open-ended, but the intention is to adopt the Canadian Organic Standards in Ontario and require that all products labelled as organic be certified. At the same time, we hope to develop a made-in-Ontario solution to ensure that certification is inclusive and appropriate for organic businesses of all scales.

The Organic Council of Ontario is seeking your input on how to do this, particularly with respect to small-scale producers and businesses. With funding from the Trillium Foundation, we will be discussing the issues with producers and businesses from across the province over the winter season. You have until March 22nd to provide your feedback. The survey will take approximately 30 minutes.
